Confession of Faith

Smalcald Articles, Part II, Article I

We boldly confess what we believe.

The first and chief article is this, that Jesus Christ, our God and Lord, died for our sins, and was raised again for our justification. And He alone is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. And God has laid upon Him the iniquities of us all. Likewise: All have sinned and are justified without merit (freely, and without their own works or merits) by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, in His blood. Now, since it is necessary to believe this, and it cannot be otherwise acquired or apprehended by any work. law, or merit, it is clear and certain that this faith alone justifies us as St. Paul says, "For we conclude that a man is justified by faith, without the deeds of the Law. That He might be just, and the Justifier of him who believes in Christ." Of this article nothing can be yielded or surrendered nor can anything be granted or permitted contrary to it, even though heaven and earth and whatever will not abide, should sink to ruin. "For there is no other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved," says Peter. And with His stripes we are healed.

Isaiah 52:13-53:12

Behold, my servant shall act wisely; he shall be high and lifted up, and shall be


exalted. ¹⁴ As many were astonished at you-- his appearance was so marred, beyond human semblance, and his form beyond that of the children of mankind-- ¹⁵ so shall he sprinkle many nations. Kings shall shut their mouths because of him, for that which has not been told them they see, and that which they have not heard they understand. ¹ Who has believed

what he has heard from us? And to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? 2 For he arew up before him like a young plant, and like a root out of dry ground; he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, and no beauty that we should desire him. ³ He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. 4 Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; vet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God. and afflicted. ⁵ But he was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed. 6 All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned-- every one-- to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. ⁷ He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he opened not his mouth. 8 By oppression and judgment he was taken away; and as for his generation, who considered that he was cut off out of the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people? 9 And they made his grave with the wicked and with a rich man in his death, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth. 10 Yet it was the will of the LORD to crush him; he has put him to grief; when his soul makes an offering for guilt, he shall see his offspring; he shall prolong his days; the will of the LORD shall prosper in his hand. 11 Out of the anguish of his soul he shall see and be satisfied; by his knowledge shall the righteous one, my servant, make many to be accounted righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. 12 Therefore I will divide him a portion with the many, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he poured out his soul to death and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and makes intercession for the transgressors.

Who Can Condemn Me?

Isaiah 50:8-9a (ESV) "He who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who is my adversary? Let him come near to me. Behold, the Lord GOD helps me; who will declare me guilty?"

Imagine you are on trial before God. The devil serves as prosecuting attorney, and all your friends and family are court-ordered to testify against you. What is their testimony? They are to present what they know of your sinful tendencies, your fleshly weaknesses, your shortcomings, your darkest secrets. How could you possibly escape with an innocent verdict?

As He hung on the cross, the sins of all mankind were presented before the Father as evidence against Jesus. Christ's adversary the devil thought he had finally won. And yet as Jesus speaks through the prophet Isaiah, He announces that He was ready to face the devil in His Father's court. Why? Because His Father was there to help. He would clear His Son of blame; no charges would stick.

The Apostle Paul quotes from these verses, but instead of speaking about Jesus, he applies it to you and me: "Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died-- more than that, who was raised-- who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us." (Romans 8:33-34) Like Christ, you may stand ready for trial before the Lord. Though the devil may accuse you and all your sins brought as evidence against you, your Savior is near. He clears you of all blame. No charges can stick.
