Confession and Absolution

“If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.” (1 John 1:9)

P Let us confess our sins in the presence of God and of one another.

C **Holy and gracious God, I confess that I have sinned against You this day. Some of my sin I know—the thoughts and words and deeds of which I am ashamed—but some is known only to You. In the name of Jesus Christ, I ask forgiveness. Deliver and restore me that I may rest in peace.**

P By the mercy of God we are redeemed by Jesus Christ, and in Him we are forgiven. Tonight, we may rest now in His peace and rise again in the morning to serve Him. Amen.

Scripture selections based on our Lenten Series

P By awesome deeds you answer us with righteousness, O God of our salvation, the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas. *(Ps. 65:5)*

C **We have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner place behind the curtain, where Jesus has gone as a forerunner on our behalf.** *(Heb. 6:19)*

P And the LORD said to Moses, “Tell Aaron your brother not to come at any time into the Holy Place inside the veil.” *(Lv. 16:2)*

C **We have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that He opened for us through the curtain, that is, through His flesh.** *(Heb. 10:19-22)*

P The LORD is my strength and my song, and He has become my salvation. *(Ex. 15:2)*

C **And being made perfect, He became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey Him.** *(Heb. 5:9)*

P And on the seventh day God finished His work that He had done, and He rested on the seventh day from all His work that He had done. *(Gen. 2:2)*

C **For if Joshua had given them rest, God would not have spoken of another day later on. So then, there remains a Sabbath rest for the people of God.** *(Heb. 4:9)*

P The whole bull he shall carry outside the camp to a clean place, to the ash heap, and shall burn it up on a fire of wood.

C **So Jesus also suffered outside the gate in order to sanctify the people through His own blood.** *(Lev. 4:12; Heb. 13:12)*

P On the morning of the third day there were thunders and lightnings and a thick cloud on the mountain and a very loud trumpet blast, so that all the people in the camp trembled.

C **But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem. To Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.** *(Ex. 19:16; Heb. 12:22)*

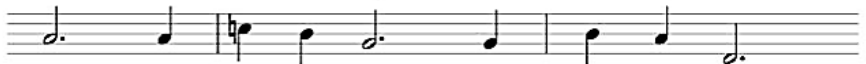
