2 Chronicles 29:15-19

[The Levites] gathered their brothers and consecrated themselves and went in as the king had commanded, by the words of the LORD, to cleanse the house of the LORD. ¹⁶ The priests went into the inner part of the house of the LORD to cleanse it, and they brought out all the uncleanness that they found in the temple of the LORD into the court of the house of the LORD. And the Levites took it and carried it out to the brook Kidron. ¹⁷ They began to consecrate on the first day of the first month, and on the eighth day of the month they came to the vestibule of the LORD. Then for eight days they consecrated the house of the LORD, and on the sixteenth day of the first month they finished. ¹⁸ Then they went in to Hezekiah the king and said, "We have cleansed all the house of the LORD, the altar of burnt offering and all its utensils, and the table for the showbread and all its utensils. ¹⁹ All the utensils that King Ahaz

discarded in his reign when he was faithless, we have made ready and consecrated, and behold, they are before the altar of the LORD."

John 2:13-17

The Passover of the Jews was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴ In the temple he found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the money-changers sitting there. ¹⁵ And making a whip of cords, he drove them all out of the temple, with the sheep and oxen. And he poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶ And he told those who sold the pigeons, "Take these things away; do not make my Father's house a house of trade." ¹⁷ His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me."

Galatians 2:16-21

Yet we know that a person is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ, so we also have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ and not by works of the law, because by works of the law no one will be justified. ¹⁷ But if, in our endeavor to be justified in Christ, we too were found to be sinners, is Christ then a servant of sin? Certainly not! ¹⁸ For if I rebuild what I tore down, I prove myself to be a transgressor. ¹⁹ For through the law I died to the law, so that I might live to God. ²⁰ I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me. ²¹ I do not nullify the grace of God, for if righteousness were through the law, then Christ died for no purpose.



We boldly confess what we believe using the following words from the Formula of Concord — on Justification by Faith.

“We unanimously believe, teach, and confess the following about the righteousness of faith before God:

A poor sinful person is justified before God, that is, absolved and declared free and exempt from all his sins and from the sentence of well-deserved condemnation, and is adopted into sonship and inheritance of eternal life, without any merit or worth of his own.

This happens without any preceding, present, or subsequent works, out of pure grace, because of the sole merit, complete obedience, bitter suffering, death, and resurrection of our Lord Christ alone. His obedience is credited to us for righteousness. These treasures are brought to us by the Holy Spirit in the promise of the holy Gospel.

Faith alone is the only means through which we lay hold on, accept, apply, and take them for ourselves. This faith is God’s gift, by which we truly learn to know Christ, our Redeemer, in the Word of the Gospel and trust in Him. We trust that for the sake of His obedience alone we have the forgiveness of sins by grace, are regarded as godly and righteous by God the Father, and are eternally saved.”

What is a Lutheran? Many Christians today might not know what a Lutheran is. “Is that a cult?” “What’s the difference between that and Christian?” While we proudly bear the

name “Lutheran,” that does not mean we worship Martin Luther. In 1519, “Lutheran” was a derogatory slur used against Martin Luther by the German Scholastic theologian Dr. Johann Eck during their debate in Leipzig, Germany. The Catholics followed the practice of naming a heretical group after its leader, and so Eck and all Catholics began using “Lutheran” as an offensive word to describe anyone who followed the teachings of Martin Luther.

What were those teachings? Simply put, they're God's teachings—that we are saved by God's free **Grace Alone**; justified through **Faith Alone** apart from our works; and the basis for our hope of salvation is **Scripture Alone**. These ought to be truths eagerly proclaimed by anyone who would call themselves Christian; sadly that is not the case. Nevertheless, this is what we believe and hold fast to, not because it was taught by Luther, but because it was taught by Christ Himself.

So what is a Lutheran? A Lutheran is a Christian. A Lutheran believes strongly that all Christian teachings should come from the Bible, because it is the very Word of God. A Lutheran believes that God's Word ought to be taken very seriously, as everything God says is correct and true. A Lutheran recognizes what God teaches us in His Word: that we are all sinners deserving damnation in hell, but that we are forgiven solely because Christ died to take away our sins. A Lutheran believes that this free gift of salvation is acquired by the individual through faith in Jesus as Savior—and that this faith only comes through the work of the Holy Spirit, as God tells us! In short, a Lutheran is a follower of Christ who depends entirely upon His grace and redeeming work, totally apart from any works, feelings, or decisions that we could attempt to contribute! *“For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast!”* (Ephesians 2:8-9)

On the Election – In studying the prophet Isaiah's words from 700 BC, I can't think of a more appropriate message just days

before an important election in our nation. In Isaiah 45 the Lord announces that He has anointed Cyrus to free His captive people and aid them in returning to their homeland. Incredibly, God names this Persian king well over 100 years before He is even born. What also demonstrates the Lord's complete control over the affairs of men is that Cyrus was not a believer. He did not acknowledge the Lord as the one true God. Yet that did not prevent God from using him for His saving purposes. In fact, Cyrus, as the one "anointed" by the Lord, became a type of Christ, the "Anointed One" who would deliver a world of sinners from captivity to sin and death.

It is reassuring to know that the fate of our nation does not ultimately lie in the hands of millions of voters or in the decisions and actions of whoever is elected president in a few weeks. God's Word still stands: *"I am the LORD, and there is no other"* (Is. 45:5). Nothing happens apart from His will. *"I form the light and create darkness, I bring prosperity and create disaster"* (45:7). *"The Most High is sovereign over the kingdoms of men and gives them to anyone he wishes"* (Dan. 4:17).

The Lord encourages us to bring all our concerns for our nation to Him with the confidence that His will is always good, and His will is always done for the eternal wellbeing of His people. In his letter to the exiles in Babylon, Jeremiah wrote, *"Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the LORD for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper"* (Jer. 29:7).

Having been redeemed from sin and death and given new life through Jesus' sacrifice, how could we doubt that *"He who did not spare his own Son...will graciously give us all things?"* (Rom. 8:32). May we then both as individuals and as congregations of believers go to the Lord's throne with prayers for His sovereign and gracious will to be accomplished in our lives and in our nation.

Mon Luke 10:17-20 When the Lord sent out seventy-two to prepare for His coming, they returned rejoicing in the victory over Satan which He shared with them. He points them to a cause for joy far greater!
